TRAFFIC and PARKING

The school continually receive complaints about parking at drop off and pick up times sharing their concerns about the safety of our children. The message below was received this week.

"I am a school parent but also live on Hermitage Woods Crescent. There is some inconsiderate and dangerous parking going on.

People are parking over driveways, on yellow lines, on blind corners in a way a rubbish truck or emergency vehicle could bot get through, as well as speeding while using the street as a cut through. I have also seen people parking across the yellow zig zag lines outside of the school holding up traffic or the crossing.



It's dangerous with so many children around and frustrating for local residents."

We are going to purchasing signs to remind all parents that parking on double yellow lines (even for short periods of time), blocking footpaths and stopping on zig zags lines outside of school, puts lives at risk and prevents ease of both motor and pedestrian traffic in the mornings. As a school we are also requesting traffic warden and council support to prevent inconsiderate driving and parking particularly at these times but I suspect we are on a waiting list as other schools face the same issues.

Thank you of course to those who do show respect when driving.

Please can I therefore send a plea once again, to ALL our families and ask if driving to drop off or pick up children you park and stride. Park further away from the school and walk the remaining distance to keep us all safe.

Nursery

The Nursery children have had a fantastic first half term, settling in well to their new environment, with a keen interest to explore all learning opportunities available to them.

Our topic this term has been "Me and Community," where we have drawn pictures of ourselves, using the mirrors and shared who lives in their home.

One of our main focuses has been supporting the children with recognising their own feelings and emotions. We've used the "Colour Monster" story to support the children with this. The teachers have very much enjoyed seeing the children's faces for each emotion.



We are now busy exploring Autumn and went for an Autumn walk around the school to spot the different changes we could see.

Reception

This has been an exciting half term for our new Reception children. They have worked hard to settle into their classes and have had fun making lots of new friends. As part of our Let's Explore topic the children have been talking about their families and homes. They have learned that all families are different and special. The children have begun to learn their new sounds in phonics and are starting to blend these to read words. They are now able to access Oxford Owl in order to read more level-appropriate books at home. In Maths, they have explored the concepts of more and fewer and have developed a mastery of numbers up to 4. They have been enjoying observing the changing seasons and used all sorts of natural resources creatively, including making their own recipes in the mud kitchen! We are now very excited to begin our Magnificent Machines topic when we return from our half term break.



<u>Year 1</u>

In English, we have been working on our sentences—trying to add describing words to

make our writing even more interesting! We looked at the book the Egg Box Dragon, and even got to make our own one to help us with our descriptions.



In Maths, we have been working with numbers up to 20, including making comparisons and looking at how we can find different parts

within numbers.





In Science, we have been learning about materials—and the properties of each type. We have spent time discussing which materials should be used for different jobs and how we can spot the differences between man made and natural materials.



In Art, we have been discovering about mixing colours and have focussed our attention on Kandinsky—who used bright colours in his artwork. Here are some of our Kandinsky colour circles.



<u>Year 2</u>

The children have settled very well into Year 2 and have been thoroughly enjoying our topic of Movers and Shakers. We have been reading Rapunzel by Bethan Woolvin, exploring the illustrations and different vocabulary used. The children have then created their own trap to catch a witch and we have made our own class instruction manuals. In Maths, the children have been consolidating their knowledge of place value, partitioning numbers and comparing these with other numbers within 100. In DT this term, the children have been learning how to peel, chop, grate and mash different foods as well as experimenting with raw and cooked vegetables.



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<u>Year 3</u>

This year, Year 3 will be joining in with exciting sessions with a company called 'Wilder Schools'. They work with the Surrey Wildlife Trust to learn how we can take action for nature. The children thoroughly enjoyed their first session and are very excited for the next one!





<u>Year 4</u>

Year 4 have enjoyed using their sewing skills in DT to make their very own felt phone cases. The children did a fantastic job in planning, making and evaluating their end products. Look at some of the amazing phone cases below:









<u>Year 5</u>

This half term Year 5 have had a variety of different educational experiences. As part of our topic of space, we visited the Planetarium at Winston Churchill School. This was a fantastic opportunity for the children to develop their knowledge further and be able to visualise their learning. They were also able to use the facilities at Winston to research the space topic further. Alongside this, we have also created space mobiles using our knowledge of the planets. The children searched for sticks on the field and then used their understanding of the size and location of planets to create a mobile out of plasticine and paper.



<u>Year 6</u>

It has been a very busy half term in Year 6, especially with our science topic 'Living Things and their Habitats.' We have been learning about Carl Linnaeus classification system and using it to sort animals and plants. We visited the STEM room and looked at some magnificent invertebrates in resin and tried to classify them. We also went out in the school ground to investigate the question 'What habitat on the school ground has the greatest number of invertebrates?








Orchard
