# Communication

#### Flu cases currently highest among school children

As of 22 October 2024, the rate of confirmed cases of flu among school children aged 5 to 14 years is more than twice the rate of any other age group. Flu can be very serious for some younger children and puts many thousands in hospital every year. Please see the <u>Latest data shows twice as much flu</u> <u>among school children</u>.

Over two million school-aged children (R to Y11) have received a flu vaccination so far this autumn in England. Children respond well to the flu vaccine, which reduced hospitalisation in 2–17-year-olds by 54% in winter 2023. As flu cases rise, this will also help to protect others who are more vulnerable such as grandparents and infant siblings.

Schools play a crucial role in the success of the school-aged flu immunisation programme by supporting school clinics run by the Surrey School Immunisation Team. Delivery of flu vaccines in schools will continue until mid-December. If a child has missed out on getting their flu vaccine in school, they can access NHS community clinics run by the same team. If a child is in a clinical risk group and has missed out, they can make an appointment with their GP.

Please help to support the flu programme this autumn by signposting parents and carers to the <u>School</u> <u>Immunisation Team</u> if their child has not yet had their flu vaccine. The team can also check MMR vaccination status and provide catch-up for any children missing one or both MMR doses.

This half term, children in Reception have been exploring the theme of "What do you enjoy celebrating?" Through this engaging topic, they have delved into a variety of celebrations, including Diwali, Halloween, Hanukkah and Christmas. Furthermore, we had a discussion about how Remembrance Day is not a celebration more like a Memorial Day to honour the people who fought in wars.

The children have enjoyed learning about the different customs and traditions associated with each celebration. They created colourful rangoli patterns for Diwali, carved pumpkins for Halloween, looked at a menorah and played with dreidel for Hanukkah, decorated Christmas trees, and made poppies for Remembrance Day. These activities have not only been fun but have also helped the children appreciate the rich diversity of cultures and traditions.

The children in Nursery have been learning about different celebrations too, although they were focusing on traditional tails through the topic of 'Who's been sitting in my chair?'.

They explored the stories such as "The Three Billy Goats Gruff" or "The Three Little Pigs" through lots of engaging role-playing activities. The Nursery enjoyed acting out the characters, building bridges and houses, and even pretending to be the big bad wolf! This hands-on approach has made the stories come alive, sparking their imaginations and helping them understand the morals of these classic tales.

In addition to these celebrations, the children have been busy preparing for their Nativity play. They have been learning their lines and practicing the songs with great enthusiasm. The Nativity play is a highlight of the term, and the children were very excited to showcase their hard work to their families and friends.

This half term has been a wonderful journey of discovery and celebration, fostering a sense of community and understanding among the children. It has been heartwarming to see them embrace and enjoy the various festivities, making this a truly memorable time for everyone involved.









This half term we have loved our "Terrific Toys topic". We have dived into our toy-based text "Traction Man" by Mini Grey and wrote our own stories whilst getting to grips with speech bubbles.

We looked at Toys from the past both asking our Grandparents favourites and having our Autumn trip where the Chertsey Museum came to visit. The children loved finding about old toys; what they are made of and how they worked, and even getting to play with them!

In Design and Technology, we made our own toys: Traction man Puppets, which we designed and sewed ourselves.

To complete the term the children performed their Nativity, they worked so hard to learn their songs and lines and put on an excellent show that made us all proud.

Well done on all your hard work Year 1!





What an exciting term we have had! The children have really enjoyed exploring the book 'The Jolly Postman or Other People's Letters' by Janet and Allan Ahlberg. They have then written posters, letters, diary entry's and even adverts! They even got to meet some of the characters from Little Red Riding Hood and ask them questions. In Science, the children have been exploring microhabitats and even made a class wormery! They have been checking on the wormery daily to observe what is happening. We are looking forward to our next topic 'Oh, I do like to be beside the seaside!'.







Well Christmas is nearly upon us, where has the year gone?

We have had another busy term which included lots of fun writing, story planning and acting out our stories as well as singing and cooking.

In Science, we have been learning all about animals and humans, including body parts and nutrition and what is required for a healthy and balanced diet. Over the last few weeks, we have also been busy tasting different types of flat breads and dips as part of understanding about nutrition with the children really enjoying making their own flat bread and dips! The children nailed the recipe and the flatbreads were delicious.

This activity was also a great and fun way for us to use our Maths knowledge to help understand the importance of measuring correctly, adding ingredients precisely and following instructions



carefully.

On Friday 8<sup>th</sup> November, Year 4 participated in an excellent workshop run by Mexicolore! The children enjoyed learning about the weapons the Maya and Aztec people used, why they sacrificed people, the importance of cocoa in everyday life and how this was used as the currency to buy goods and food. They also learnt how to chant from one to four in Mayan and even had a chance to play the different musical instruments and wear Mayan and Aztec clothing!





It has been an exciting and busy half term in Year 5, with lots of enjoyable learning and activities taking place. As part of our topic of World War One, we visited Brookwood Cemetery. The children enjoyed learning about the War graves and the soldiers who died in World War One. This was a thoroughly moving and interesting experience for the children and really brought their learning to life. We were very proud of how the children demonstrated of Respect whilst on the trip. In Art, the children have been enjoying creating their own Poppy Art, using water colours and silhouettes. In our Science topic, Materials, the children have been scientists by testing different materials by strength, absorbency and durability.





This half term, Year 6 have had a lot of fun combining their learning of Science with Design & Technology (DT). The Science has been about electricity and building circuits and DT has been designing buggies. First, the class built chassis, arranged a series of cogs in such a way that the buggies became front wheel drive and then they added battery packs and motors.





Even using the minimum of materials, the inventiveness of some of the children has been interesting. Add a little colour to the wheels and put some flames for the exhaust is one way of sprucing up the buggy, or you could even build a prototype shell, then do the hard cover version as shown here. The project certainly caught the children's attention – and their imagination.







We have been very busy during this term with lots of different football tournaments! We have been impressed with the attitude of the children throughout the term – who have all represented the school well whilst wearing the school colours! A special well done to our girls' team who won the district competition and will now be representing Woking Schools in a county competition at Dorking Football Stadium.



Another congratulations to both our Year 6 and Year 5 boys' teams who both won their fixtures in the Surrey School's County cups and have their next round matches coming up in the Spring Term.
